CONVOY PROCEDURES

At the commencement of the trip, the Trip Leader shall arrange the convoy order and nominate a vehicle to be last in the convoy (Tail End Charlie). All vehicle shall stay in the convoy order unless directed otherwise by the Trip Leader.

COMMUNICATIONS

Convoy communication shall be by the designated CB Radio or UHF Radio channel selected. The nationally recognized 4WD convoy channel is Channel 10 on both AM and UHF frequencies.

Our club uses channel 12 UHF.

If you are unable to make radio contact, flash your headlights onto the vehicle ahead. This is a signal for the rest of the convoy to stop.

Keep unnecessary chatter on the radio to a minimum when navigating difficult areas.

If in doubt of the best / safest way to proceed through hazards / obstacles, ask the Trip Leader or more experienced driver for advice. Remember you probably won't be the only one experiencing difficulty.

Acknowledge all radio calls from the Trip Leader.

TRAVELLING

Keep the vehicle behind you in view at all times and at any decision point (corner, deviation, and obstacle):

- Wait for the following vehicle.
- Indicate where to go (use indicators if appropriate).
- When acknowledgment is received, then proceed.

Drive at your COMFORTABLE and SAFE speed. Generally, keep 4-6 vehicle lengths distance between vehicles and keep the convoy moving.

On steep inclines / obstacles:

- Proceed one vehicle at a time.

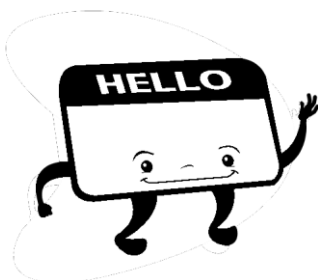
On very steep or difficult terrain:

- Call the next vehicle through when you are clear.

All gates are to be left as they were found. The Trip Leader is responsible to ensure that the last vehicle knows to leave the gate open or closed.

Vehicles should not leave the convoy other than in exceptional circumstances and before doing so must obtain approval from the Trip Leader.

Part 3

Day 12 .Thursday Island

It was an early start to travel back to Seisia to meet the 8am ferry that would take us across to Thursday Island. The crossing takes approx. 1hr 10mins and cruises along a narrow passage between Prince of Wales and Horn Islands

Thursday Island is a tiny Island, only 3.5 square Kilometres, very picturesque and full of History. Most of the work on the island is public servant based.

After a short walk around the main township area the 3 of us boarded our tour bus for a 1/12 hr guided tour.

We stopped at the old fort on Green Hill which has been set up as a museum. There are 3 guns located on top of Greenhill, 1 facing NE and 2 facing South. The guns were originally set up to protect against a Russian invasion which never eventuated.

The views from Greenhill are breath taking with 360 degrees views of the Island and the Torres strait. We also visited the cemetery where at least 700 pearl divers are buried (mostly Japanese).

We enjoyed a nice pub lunch overlooking the water and then at 2.30 caught the ferry back to Seisia.

We returned to Punsand bay and our camp for a relaxing evening.



Day 13. 5 Beaches

We had a quiet day today. We drove up to Somerset which is just passed the tip turn off and out to the coast. The beach run only takes around half an hour, but the views are breath taking.

We then took a run out to Mutee Head where we had lunch. There is an old radar antenna out there.

A drive out to the mouth of the Jardine river completed our day.

We enjoyed pizzas cooked at the bar at our camp and had a couple of drinks.



Day 14. The Flight

The camp at Punsand bay has a helicopter based there with 5 different flight options for a flight over the tip of Cape York.

We all did a 20 minute flight which took us out over the tip of Cape York, Somerset and Albany Island. We were blessed with a picture-perfect day, no clouds. The views of the very top of Australia from the air were simply breathtaking. It offers a completely different perspective of this region. It was a cracker of a flight.



Day 15. Ussher Point/Eliot /Twin Falls

It was time to pack up and leave Punsand Bay. We had a fabulous time here and I highly recommend this place for Cape York camping. It has everything, even beer. !!

Today we headed down the Bamaga road and turned off for a 2-hour detour out to Ussher point.

Ussher point is known for the colourful bauxite cliffs and the spectacular coastal views. We drove out to Ussher Point. There is a short but steep sandy track that leads to the very top of the Bauxite cliff face. Amazing views.

Heading back out and the track was not only deceptively steep, but the sand was deeper than it looked. We had to have to go to get up having to let a lot more air out of the tyres and I might add there isn't anything to winch off. Geoff was next, and he didn't make it under his own steam. Warren had to winch him up. Mark also needed a helping hand to get up.

We drove around the top of the cliff and down to Ussher point south and onto the beach for a short beach run. Again, the sand coming off the beach was deceptively soft and deep, and Mark needed a snatch to get him up the first section.

We then headed back to the Jardine, across on the ferry and into Eliot/Twin falls camping ground for the night. This camping area has to be prebooked and paid for as it is part of the National park.

After we set up camp we enjoyed a refreshing swim at Eliot Falls to wash away the days dust and dirt. The falls are just divine, the water is so clear and refreshing.

The next morning, we packed up and before we headed off we enjoyed one last swim in the crystal-clear waters of Eliot falls. This is a great camping area with good size camp sites and toilet facilities.

Day 16. Captain Billy's Landing

This was a short day. It is only 45 mins from the Bamaga road out to Captain Billy's landing. Captain Billy's Landing is a spot in Cape York named after an aboriginal from the 1800's who called himself Captain Billy. It was the site of an experimental cattle export venture during the 1960's which is when the actual barge landing was built, the remnants of which can still be seen today.

This is another camp ground that must be prebooked and paid for.

It can be windy here as it is flat and completely exposed to the trade winds, however we were very fortunate that we had a calm day. It is a quite large camping area with toilets and a small covered BBQ area. The tide was out so we were able to walk along the beach and explore the tiny caves. It is very pretty coastline.



Day 17. Musgrave Station

We had a short day today arriving at Musgrave station to camp the night. Excellent camping ground with shady trees and grass.

We enjoyed a meal at the restaurant and then settled back to celebrate Marks Birthday and watch a game of rugby league.

Day 18. Musgrave Station to Cape Melville

Today we headed east to Cape Melville. We passed through Kalpowar Crossing. This has to be one of the best camping areas before the cape. Big grassy sites, plenty of shade and has both toilet and shower facilities' not swim here as there have been several croc sightings. Again, this is a prebooked and paid camping area.

At the intersection of the Wakooka ruins we turned left and headed up to Cape Melville. It is a 2-hour drive. Fairly good track. We had not gone far when Mark reported smoke coming out of the cabin of his 4by. Apparently his radio had shorted. Warren was able to disconnect and pull out the affected wiring and soon we were on our way. We camped at Oyster catcher Bay camping area. Nice spot well off the beach amongst some big old trees.

We watched the sun go down, a turtle was spotted, no fish were caught. It was a very peaceful place, but very very remote. There are no facilities here.



Day 19. Cape Melville to Elim Beach

We travelled back to the intersection at the Wakooka ruins and turned left heading for Hopevale and Elim beach. This is 160ks and took us 6 hours. The track is in good condition for the first 20 ks or so but after that it deteriorates. Ruts, narrow sections, washouts and steep ledges. It is a very slow track but a lot of fun. It is not suitable for towing unless the camper is small and light. It was a long day and we finally arrived at Elim beach around 4pm. We decided to stay 2 nights here as it is such a relaxing and peaceful place and there is a bit to see and do here. This is bush camping at its best. The hosts are friendly and very knowledgeable of the area. The showers are cold but it is warm up there so that's not an issue and you may have to share your shower with cute little green tree frogs.

Day 20. Cape Bedford

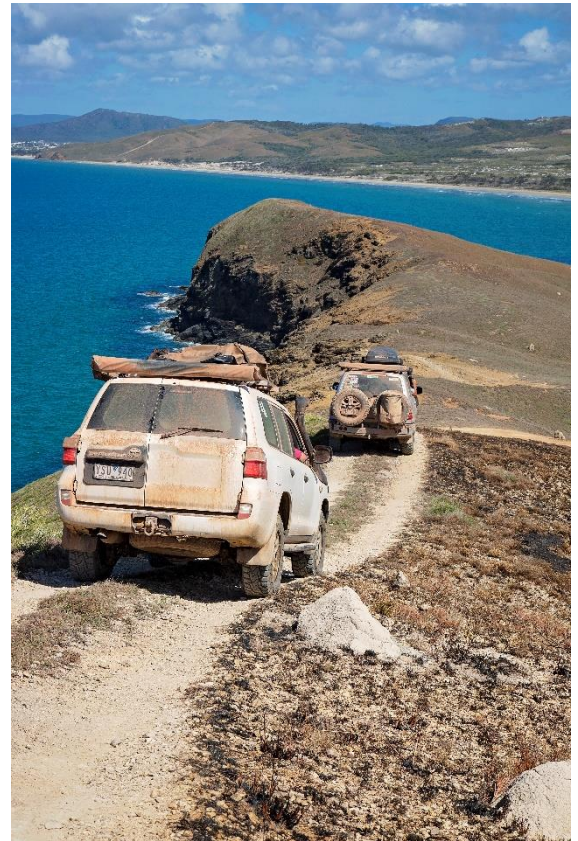
Today we set off to explore the Cape Bedford area. There are many good sand tracks to entertain as well as some breath-taking scenery. We made our way out to the beach and spotted a track climbing up a steep hill that looked like it would not only provide an interesting drive but great views as well. It turned out to be a lot steeper than it looked with drop offs on both sides and the track literally stopped on top of this ridge.

This created a level of discomfort as turning around proved to be more difficult than anticipated. It required nerves of steel, pin point accuracy and Geoff as a spotter for both Warren and Mark. We

finally turned got both vehicles turned around and with nerves somewhat frayed we headed back to camp.

Later that day Warren and myself headed down the beach beside our camp to explore the well known Coloured sand cliffs. We climbed in amongst the cliff chasms. The colours of the sands are quite amazing, very bright. Mother nature as out done herself here. We gathered some fire wood and returned to camp.

We had a relaxing evening, reflected on this day and in fact our whole trip which was about to come to an end.





Day 21. Cape tribulation

We left Elim beach and headed for Cape Trib, had a brief stop in Cooktown and then made our way down the Bloomfield Track. This track /road winds through the world heritage ancient forests of the Daintree. It is spectacular scenery.

We crossed the Daintree on the ferry and made camp at Cape Trib camping. This is a really nice camping ground on the coast. We even managed to harvest a couple of coconuts thanks to Geoff. We spent just one night here.

Day 22. Cairns

We pulled into the caravan park that we started from 22 days earlier. We had 2 nights here to clean the vehicles and unwind for a day before we went our separate ways to begin our journeys home. We had an amazing journey, the cape has so much to offer and we still missed some of the sights. Still, our trip was full of adventure, laughter and fun. Thanks to Geoff and Mark for coming along to experience this journey with us.

Cape York Tips

1. Do your research/ plan out your trip
 2. Prebook and pay on line for any camping areas within the national parks. (Camping is not free in Cape York Nat parks)
 3. Take out top cover RACV before you leave. It is very remote on the Cape and towing fees etc are very expensive.
 4. Check your vehicle as best you can and carry some basic spares.
 5. Have a working radio
 6. Once onto the gravel keep tyre pressures low as the ruts can be unforgiving
 7. The dust is thick, so keep safe distances when following others.
 8. Check the river crossings before crossing and pick your line.
 9. Where possible, research the tracks, and have an idea of length and time
- Get to the Cape and have yourselves one hell of a time
