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GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

No General Meeting was held in August 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Dear Members,

The coronavirus restrictions have had a profound impact of many facets of life, which includes camping and four wheel driving and therefore the functioning of the Geelong Four Wheel Drive Club.

Four Wheel Drive Victoria has contacted the Club with "Preliminary Advice -FWDV Membership Renewal 2020-2021". FWDV has deferred the requirement to pay their affiliation fees and insurance until the 30th of November 2020. The affiliation fee for the remainder of the year has been reduced to \$20 (previously \$39). The insurance component has also been deferred and the cost is to be advised.

Membership renewals for the Geelong 4WD Club were issued on the 1st of April with a due date of 31st May.

In view of the advice from FWDV, the committee has deferred the requirement to pay membership until further notice.

For those who have already paid their membership, the club will refund this on request. Please contact me if you require this. For those who have already paid, but do not currently require a refund, next year's membership will be reduced to reflect any reduction in this year's fees.

Wait.!! We were quite astounded. There was not another 4by to be seen!!!!!


We had Big Red all to ourselves. How good was this?!

I grew up in a four wheel driving family. My parents were members of the Toyota Landcruiser Club and the Range Rover Club, which by default made me a member since I was two years old. Much of my childhood was spend four wheel driving and camping as we travelling across this beautiful country of ours, visiting some of the most remote parts of this land.

My dad was a Level 1 instructor with the Victorian Association of 4WD Clubs (VAFWDC) and he taught me, my two brothers and my sister how to drive. I have many memories of being a young teenager and driving through bush or up and down sand dunes with my dad sitting beside me (one hand on the hand brake, like that was going to do anything!). He was always a very calm teacher and an excellent driver; to this day I have not seen one better.

When I was around 10 years old, we moved from Melbourne to the Albury/ Wodonga area. Not long after we moved to the area Mum and Dad saw an ad in the paper about a meeting to be held at the Lavington Sports Club, with the view of forming a 4WD Club. They attended the meeting, along with about 30 others and the Albury Wodonga 4WD Club was formed. They joined at that meeting, along with about 20 others, and became inaugural members of the Albury Wodonga 4WD Club. They remained members of the club for 21 years, until Dad became too sick to drive. It's not surprising then that many of my childhood memories involve club trips or events.

Matthew and I began dating in 1997. Matthew and I were both heavily involved in Scouting at the time, so it was no great surprise that we both loved getting out and about in nature. Matthew had a Subaru Leone and we would get together with our mates and drive around the dirt tracks out the back of Corowa.

Matthew and I bought our first four wheel drive in 2010, a Toyota Prado. We were planning to take a trip around Australia and needed a car that would do the job. Even though all our friends said we were crazy to take off for 2 months with three young kids in tow, we did it anyway. The Prado took us through Central Australia, to the top of Western Australia, down the west coast and across the Nullarbor, towing our Coromal caravan. The car didn't miss a beat.

A few years later we took off for another 2 months in the Prado, this time up Central NSW to Cape York, then down the East Coast. Even though we drowned the car on this trip in Nolan's Brook, on the Old Telegraph Track, it still took us all the way to the tip of Australia and home again, with only minimal problems. To this day the Prado is still running, albeit, not as smoothly as it once did.

We joined the Geelong 4WD Club in 2011 looking for like minded people (others who were crazy enough to take kids out bush!). Out first club trip was a snow trip run by Gary Welsh. We found the club members that we went away with friendly and supportive and we knew we had found the right club for us.

Both Matthew and I joined the committee in around 2015. Matthew served as Vice President, and Regional Rep. I served as Social Coordinator and Treasurer, a role I currently hold.

Over our time at the club Matthew and I have run numerous trips, from days trips to two weeks adventures. One of my favourite club trips was Fraser Island and Morton Island. Two weeks driving along beautiful beaches with good friends, what could be better than that? Beach driving is certainly a favourite of mine, with my favourite place on Earth being Beachport in South Australia. While we have only run 3 club trips to Beachport (so far), I have been going there every year for the past 30 years.

Matthew and I bought our second four wheel drive in 2016, a Toyota

Landcruiser, 200 series. This car has taken us to The Simpson Dessert, The Darling River, The Flinders Rangers, across sand, snow and mud and we love it.

Both Matthew and I love being part of the Geelong 4WD Club. We have made so many good friends within the club, been on some amazing trips and enjoyed some crazy social functions. We can't wait for the current restrictions to be lifted so we can get out on the tracks again.
