EASTER AT BEACHPORT IST TO 4TH APRIL 2021 - WORDS & PHOTOS: JUANITA MOUNTJOY

The trip started in Beachport and members made their own way down on Thursday.

Our first trip out was on Friday and we ran the beaches from Beachport to Robe. The first part of the trip was quite easy. The tides were down low and the sand was almost rock solid. We were able to stick solely to the beach, without having to go inland at all. This was the first time we have been able to do this in many years. The tide was so low that we were even able to drive around rock formations that would usually require us to go inland (or in water).

We reached Nora Creina without incident. We discovered that the track we would normally take just outside Nora Creina to get back on to the beaches had been gated, so we had to find a new way back on. Once back on the beaches we began travelling towards Robe. The traffic on this side of Nora Creina was quite busy, and the beaches were softer but still reasonably easy to drive. We made it to Robe in time for lunch with only one vehicle in our party getting stuck.

After lunch some members of our group chose to head back to camp via the black top, so we were down a few vehicles on the way home. Coming back home was like driving down Bourke Street in peak hour! There were vehicles everywhere! This made the return trip quite slow as we continuously stopped and waited for beaches or dunes to be cleared.

Matthew had to help a young guy and his mate get their seriously bogged car off the beach. By the time he was done, the que waiting to get onto that stretch of beach was easily 20 cars long. This led to some people (not members of our club) making risky decisions and at one stage Geoff nearly had his car side swiped by one such vehicle. On the way back, we ducked inland to the Buggy Club and had a play on the sand dunes before returning to camp for the night.

On Saturday we headed in the opposite direction towards Carpenters Rocks. We entered the beach at Beachport and drove to South End. For anyone who has every travelled along this stretch of beach they will know that it is notoriously soft and you have to drive up

high and on an angle to avoid the water. Not this time. The beach was solid, the tide was down low and we drove this like we would a highway.

We got off the beach at South End then entered Canunda National Park. It wasn't long before we were back on the beaches. These beaches were softer than the others we had driven so far but were still manageable. You cannot drive from the entrance of Canunda National Park to Carpenters Rocks solely along the beach. There are many points along the way when you have to get off the beach and head inland due to rock formations or the beach dropping away. It was the exits off the beach where we consistently got into trouble. Many of the exits were sharp and the sand was soft. Throughout the day every vehicle in our party (except our trusty trip leader) became bogged at one of the exits. We made good use of our shovels, Max Traxs, snatch straps and winches throughout the afternoon!

By mid afternoon we decided to call it a day, even though we hadn't made it to Carpenters Rocks, and headed inland.

We aired up just before Millicent, then headed home for dinner and drinks in the mess tent.

Our final trip was on the Sunday. The convoy (now down to 4 due to various reasons) headed out with the knowledge that this was a bit of an exploratory trip and that we would be travelling on beaches Matthew and I hadn't driven before. We headed towards Kingston on the bitumen. At Cape Jaffa we went down to the beach and drove the beach to Kingston. This was an easy drive with no issues. We got off the beach at one side of Kingston and got on again at another.

We drove for 35km, before heading in to have a play on the dunes in a sand bowl. Little did we know but we were on private property and it wasn't long before we were asked to leave by members of the dune buggy club. We continued down the beach but it wasn't long before Geoff got stuck in what was increasingly becoming soft sand. It took

a while to get him moving again, and the tides were rising so we veered off the beach and had lunch in the dunes.

beach in the dark and hope we could find the exit. At 5.45pm we called it and hit the beach again before we lost light. Luckily everyone got back onto the beach without any trouble and we drove without anyone getting stuck. We turned off the exit just as the last of the daylight faded away.

Matthew and I would like to thank everyone who came on this trip with us. It was a great weekend spent with a great group of people. We look forward to doing it all again next year!

Six vehicles set off from then Batesford Roadhouse on Friday morning. Unfortunately Tim Van Bakkum was a late withdrawal due to illness. After stopping at Horsham for fuel and lunch we made our way to Dimboola and then to the Horseshoe Bend Campground which is only about 7km from town.

After setting up camp there was an afternoon drive to the Wail State Forest where there are wood collection areas. This was essentially a circumnavigation of the State Forest, starting on Nursery Rd and then the Wail Polkemmet Rd to bring us in to the Wimmera River at the south end of the Wail State Forrest, on the other side of the river to our camp. Nevertheless after some input from the assembled "experts" it was suitably packed. We stopped for coffee in Dimboola and headed home from there.

Overall it was a good social weekend with some relatively easy sand driving which was still new to some of the participants. There was a bit of animal life to be seen which consisted of possums and

kookaburras around the camp and plenty of kangaroos in the park. There were also emus and an echidna, at least for the lead car. An emu did pose for the entire convoy on the way out of camp, just to prove they did exist.

Thanks to all who participated and to Ross who helped out as tail end charlie.


