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

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GEELONG WHEEL DRIVE CLUB

HOW THE GEELONG FOUR WHEEL DRIVE CLUB CAME TO BE

In late 1971 whilst on a working holiday and living in Gladstone, Queensland, I was one of the founding members of the Gladstone 4WD Club, and enjoyed many trips out and the companionship of other families who shared the same interests (camping, four wheeling and the great outdoors). My employer, an American construction firm, asked me to relocate to work on a new construction site in Geelong. In 1972 we arrived in Geelong and our children, Darren and Trevor, were of school age so my wife and I decided to sell the caravan and buy a house making Geelong our home.

After living in Geelong for six to nine months, we looked around and found no local 4WD Clubs in the area so decided to place an advertisement in the local paper to find other people who may be interested in starting up a Geelong 4WD Club. Much to our surprise, Les Crowe showed up on our doorstep and said he had several other families who were also interested. They had been talking about forming a club but never got around to doing it.

On the 6th May 1973, we held our first meeting at Kana Street, Grovedale and officially formed the club. I was voted in as the first President. For the first few

months we held our meetings in Les Crowe's garage (Kana Street) and we were always reminded to bring our own chairs! In our first year we had 12 to 14 families. The main vehicles at that time were Land Rover, Toyota Landcruiser and Nissan Patrol, and one lone 1942 exarmy Jeep. Our first trip was to the Brisbane Ranges.

Shortly after forming our club, other clubs approached us to create the now Association. We were one of the first four clubs in Victoria to be involved in forming the Victorian Association of Four Wheel Drive Clubs. Brian Tanner, one of our early members, became one of the Association's first Presidents. Today the Association is the umbrella body for all affiliated Four Wheel Drive Clubs in Victoria, and represents the interests of all recreational four wheel drivers in the state. It is presently made up of over 94 clubs which in turn have a membership totalling over 13,000 subscribed members representing four wheel drive enthusiasts and their families.

After some time, we found club rooms at Norlane's D W Hope Centre which was a former Migrant Hut. The Club met there for several years until the centre was demolished. Over the next 8 years we

drifted from school to school to holding meetings as one of our members worked for the Education Department. We eventually found club rooms at the Wood Street Reserve in South Geelong where we resided for approximately 15 years until it was demolished. Up until then we were one of only a few clubs in Victoria to have their own Club Rooms. In mid 2008, the Seaview Social Club invited us to affiliate with them and in January 2009 we officially moved to the Seaview club in Lovely Banks. A couple of years later the Club was successful in taking over the management of a rebuilt Council Hall and has turned this into our permanent home (and managing the sub -leasing to a dance school).

Over the years we have worked in conjunction with several councils to remove car bodies from the bush and other scrapped metals. We have also assisted with the Clean Up Australia Day efforts - mainly clearing the bush. In the mid to late 1970s the Geelong City SES was formed by volunteers from the Geelong Four Wheel Drive Club and some of our members today are still highly recognized in the State Emergency Services. David Dixon and myself were awarded the National Medal through the SES for over 15 years' service.



Our first inter-club activities were held at Forrest at a quarry and we camped at the football oval. This event was run for approximately 8 to 10 years consecutively. Then came Quarry Capers at Maude and then back to the Forrest area, Gellibrand and Dandos. Then it became Forrest Frolics, followed by Otway Antics and then Sokil Scramble. Over the years we developed a good relationship with the Bendigo 4x4 Club, whom until recently we met at least 3 times a year (Forrest, Avoca and Hopetoun). Now there is one annual event held at Moonambel on the Queen's Birthday weekend called the Moonambel Muster.

Our club trips on a regular basis include Beachport and Robe, regular activity in the Dargo High Country area, and in the winter, we often booked out the Woods Point Hotel for all our members and had some great weekends driving in the snow (this became so popular we often ran 2 to 4 trips each year). John Foot, now deceased, was one of our early members to initiate snow trips to the Woods Point area.

We have had many club members leading long trips into the outback such as: Alice Springs, The Kimberleys, Birdsville, Cape York, Fraser Island and the Curdimurka Ball. Not only have we got together in the bush, but often enjoyed social activities in the club rooms - be it a few drinks after a meeting, the large Christmas parties, presentation night held mid year (and even fancy dress ones!), hot dog nights, fundraisers—they were all great.

Over the past 45 plus years since the club was formed, I have met some wonderful people and enjoyed many a good time with them. Their children are now members themselves bringing their families along. We have since celebrated our 25th, 30th and 40th Anniversaries and now on the 6th of May 2023 - our 50th Anniversary.

A Club is only ever as good as its members, and in my opinion, our club is and always has been a fantastic club. Well done to everyone—past and present.

Saturday May 6th 2023 marked the 50th Anniversary of the Geelong Four Wheel Drive Club. After a huge amount of planning by many people the night had arrived for everyone to celebrate this remarkable milestone.

The Yot, located at the Geelong Yacht Club, was as our venue for the night. It was selected for its central location and ability to cater for everyone in comfort and style. We were thrilled to have 110 past and present members join us from far and wide with

some members traveling from Queensland, New South Wales and even Western Australia to be part of this auspicious occasion.

The room was arranged with a selection of memorabilia, clothing, and club magazines from across the years. A slideshow featuring photos from various trips and events dating back from the very early days of the club was also played on the big screen. The club clothing from different years was an interesting look back in time ... and not all of it was

green! An array of 50th
Anniversary Commemorative
Memorabilia was available for
purchase including belt buckles,
stubby holders, cups & mugs, and
hat pins. These items will still be
available for purchase throughout
the remainder of the year
through the committee.

The evening commenced at 5:30pm with guests arriving and making themselves comfortable with a beverage and a chat. We even had a couple of very stylish arrivals make their way to the



party by stretch Hummer limousines - can't get much better than that to kick off the party!

As the room filled and became louder with laughter and chatting the food and beverages began to flow. The Yot supplied a delicious selection of finger foods throughout the night along with plenty of beverage options. Everyone was well-fed and in high spirits which contributed to the joyous and animated atmosphere.

It was great to see many members enjoying the photo slideshow, stirring up memories of past trips, bringing on a few laughs and giggles and getting people talking about times they've shared in the club. Did you know that on the night we had 9 past Presidents attend (spanning a collective 19 years of presidency), 11 Life members, 17 Clubmen and Clubwomen and 11 "Dunny Seat" award members.

Wayne Hevey from Four Wheel Drive Victoria was in attendance and congratulated the club on reaching the 50-year milestone.







He presented the club with a commemorative plaque. The Geelong Four Wheel Drive Club played a significant role in the establishment of the Association and maintains a strong bond and relationship with Four Wheel Drive Victoria still today.

Two separate panels were held through the night to have a very relaxed and informal chat about anything and everything that has happened within the club since its inception. Our first panel discussion for the night, 'A Chat with the Boys' (or maybe 'The Kangaroo Bar') consisted of the following participants:

- •Founding member and inaugural President, Life Member, previous Clubman of the Year and 2 time Dunny Seat award winner Werner Brocks.
- •Founding member and the club's second President Les Crowe.
- •Founding member Pam Crowe.
- •Life Member, previous Clubman of the Year Brian Tanner, and
- •Life Member and previous Clubman of the Year Alex Huybens.



Some of the many and various topics covered by the panel included how the club came about, the early years' trips, vehicles and accessories, the State Emergency Service (SES) and the origins of the club logo. Roving reporter Trevor Brocks made sure everyone in the audience could participate by asking questions for the panel or sharing their own historical anecdotes, memorable moments from trips, events and social nights within the club.

How the club started really is a story within itself and covered by Werner in his story 'How the club came to be' page 12 of the magazine. In the very early days we were one of the very first four wheel drive clubs in Victoria. At the time our club was formed there were only three other clubs: the Land Rover Club, the Jeep Club and the Toyota Club. Now there are over 90 clubs under the Victorian Four Wheel Drive Association.

The early trips were predominantly local with the first one being an easy exploration of the Brisbane Ranges before venturing further afield to Apollo Bay, Forrest, and deeper into the Otways. In those early years the most popular vehicles were Land Rovers, Land Cruisers, Patrols and a few Jeeps. They lacked power

steering, had 3 or 4-speed manuals and no electronic assistance. Driving those vehicles required skill and control. Lowering tyre pressures wasn't common as the tyres couldn't accommodate it and wheel chains were a common necessity when tackling challenging terrain. Bull bars were typically simple, agricultural items made from welded pipes or whatever materials were available, and accessories - there weren't any!

Brian explained a little about the club '4' logo. The original logo was roughly based on a manual gear shift pattern and consisted pretty much of a condensed '4' pattern (a '4' squeezed from both sides). It was used on a few of the early brown covered magazines. Brian redrew it to the more proportioned '4' with the outline around it, somewhere around 1976-77. It was then used on a green windcheater and a run of bronze badges which members attached to their vehicles. That logo is still the official club logo to this day, used on the club magazine and plenty of other places.











Our relationship with the SES started very early on – members of the Club basically were the first SES group in Geelong. They were given a generator and a couple of lights and asked to assist in setting up lighting etc to help at traffic accidents and other emergencies.

The club's first ever meeting was held in Les Crowe's garage! Since then we have held meetings at the DW Hope Centre in Norlane, various schools that were available, the Wood Street Reserve in South Geelong, the Seaview Club and now in our current clubrooms at the Abe Wood Reserve.

One particularly memorable adventure - the 'Whitfield Episode' – included quite a large convoy, multiple boggings, changing weather and a very steep hill. Going downhill while the weather was fine was great but trying to come back up in the rain not so much. At least the radio could pick up the footy for a little amusement.

Our club has always been willing to lend a hand throughout the



Otways region – helping out in the early days with the removal of Boneseed weed. We have also helped out with removal of car bodies and general rubbish, track classifications and track clearing and opening which we continue to do annually.

During the second panel discussion we had the pleasure of hosting some of the prominent women who have been part of the club throughout the years: Julie Brocks, Jan Napper and Ornella Di Rocco along with past President Adam Cameron. A great discussion was held on the history of the larger annual club events starting off at Apollo Bay and spanning the Boho Bounce, Gippsland Go Down, Quarry Capers, Forrest Frolics, Otway Antics and Sokil Scramble right up to the current Moonambel Muster – which this year we are celebrating 12 years continuous running of this event.



We heard fond memories of how the club and its members have always been up for some competition whether it was between members and other clubs and with many varied games and contests at the events. We've held dress up events, annual Christmas parties for the kids to play and enjoy a visit from Santa, presentation nights, trivia nights and plenty more.

Beachport and Robe have become an annual staple for the club with many families attending over the years and forming strong bonds. The extended club families have always been a feature of the club no matter what age the children (or adults), everyone looks after each other's like their own. The annual Snow Trip up around Woods Point is another annual event looked forward to by so many within the club. The snow trips are so popular that we usually run two!

The Mud Chicks group was originally formed to assist families going through difficult times with an illness of a main family member or even the arrival of a newborn baby. The Mud Chicks would work out meals to be made and delivered to the family to ease the burden. They used to meet one Wednesday a month, usually at the old Pancake Parlour late evening and the women were able to get out and catch up whilst the men stayed home with young kids.
