Day 1 - Sunday 17th September



We all left camp around 9.30 to start our day exploring, the first place was Pulpit Rock Lookout. The lookout looks over the Derwent River, on the





St Helens was the destination for the next 2 nights - we had a regroup, had showers, did some washing and had a drive to a lookout for some views that were a bit hard to see.




Drinks, bickies and cheese and a night around the campfire ended our day.
