





Danny's team cleared and opened Hayden, Kings 1/2/3, Thompson and Newcombe Spur tracks before a quick lunch on the tracks. We found a few smaller trees and many branches down requiring clearing,

but no major obstacles this year - a little unexpected. We did see that some seasonal closure gates had been cut and opened, and signs that the tracks had been used recently.

After lunch the team moved on to some of the tracks we usually do Sunday - putting us in a great position for the next day.

DROP-IN DROP-OUT SA ADVENTURE

The trip was scheduled to leave on Saturday 20th of September with an approximate 8 hour drive to the first camp site at Kapunda, however we decided to leave Friday night to get a bit of a head start. Our first camp was at Bordertown at a free campsite that we always stay at when we travel that way. It's a great little spot by a lake that is stocked with trout.

Saturday 20th September

First thing in the morning we made our way to another free camp spot just outside of Kapunda at Greenock, where the Mountjoys and Nathan met us in the afternoon. It had toilets, dedicated communal fire pit and a nice big footy oval for the kids to play and kick the footy.

Greenock is a great little town with wineries in abundance and even a

brewery, which I highly recommend visiting. After setting up camp, we all walked to explore the town before ending up at the brewery chatting with the locals over a drink.

The owner is a bit of a character and had us highly entertained with his jokes and tales about his "special" brews of heavy beer (a metal beer bottle), light beer (beer with fairy lights inside), grate beer (a bottle with a grater on the side), spring water (a tap welded onto a spring) and his Coke cane addiction (a cane made of Coke cans). Of course, the dads all appreciated the jokes and proceeded to tell their own while the rest of us rolled our eyes. Finishing our drinks we ended the night off with dinner at the local pub and getting a good night's rest for the next leg to Bendleby Ranges.

Sunday 21st September

Leaving Greenock behind, our convoy made its way to Bendleby Ranges but not before stopping at the mind-bending Magnetic Hill outside Orroroo. Magnetic Hill is named so because if you leave your car in neutral on what appears to be a road with a slight incline you will begin to roll in the opposite direction. The direction of which your car rolls (up or down hill) tells you if your car is made of plastic or metal. Apparently all our 4wd's were made of plastic as we rolled backwards instead of forwards.

Magnetic Hills are a trick of the eye based on the how we perceive the landscape against the horizon. So, where you think that you're on flat ground or a slight incline/decline it is in fact the opposite and you will roll in a direction differently to how your



eyes perceive the landscape. A mind boggling conundrum worth dropping into for a bit of fun for the kids and big kids alike. Leaving Magnetic Hill, we continued onto Bendleby Ranges where we met with the Fitzpatrick's as they were setting up camp.

Bendleby Ranges provides both serviced and bush camp options for their guests with complimentary firewood on arrival. We were also welcomed by the local birds that were friendly enough to come right up to us and squawk loudly demanding we feed them. The campgrounds provide open views of the area with a few trees to provide privacy between the campsites and communal facilities similar to a caravan park. After setting up camp, we all settled into the evening with good food and drinks, eager to start the next day for some driving.

Monday 22nd September

A new morning and challenge awaited us at Bendleby Ranges with the convoy having a good feed before starting the trip. We all made our way to start the more difficult tracks from Gum Creek Drive where the track presented some dry rock creeks that required some careful low range navigation to get us to Link Track.

Link Track provides a steep ascent with a small rock step for us as our first challenge of the day. With careful wheel placement and a little bit of right foot as a bump, every vehicle made it up without any trouble. We continued to move on to find more difficult sections on the way to Marchant Hill. One of the unmarked tracks that was suggested to us by the staff provided a great challenge even prompting another traveller to ask us for a spot to navigate down a particularly tricky decent. Happy to oblige we assisted the Patrol and Defender with their wheel placements to give them a smooth and controlled path down.

Reaching the summit of Marchant













Hill provided us with a stunning panoramic view (albeit a bit windy) while we parked up for lunch and had a chat. Packing up our food and rubbish we started to make our way back to camp finishing off the drive back along Gum Creek drive.

Arriving at camp we were quick to make use of the shower facilities to refresh ourselves and settle into the evening around the fire with dinner and some drinks.

Tuesday 23rd September

The next day we set off to tackle the Hungry Ranges, a much more formidable challenge than Bendleby. Starting in the northern end of the ranges we followed the North Fence Track to complete a loop via Quartz Gorge and the Hungry Highway. A nice taste for what was to come. Quartz Gorge provided a nice easy/ medium challenge through dry riverbeds and short but steep climbs where even our learner drivers in the convoy got to have a wheel. Eager to hit the hardest of tracks available we quickly made our way through Ridge Top and down the East Fence Track to tackle the famous Billy Goat Ridge.

Billy Goat Ridge provided a steep narrow climb with near vertical drops on either side of the track. Plenty of rock steps were in the way to make us think twice about taking the wrong line but with careful spotting and precision wheel placement we all managed to white knuckle our way to the top and then again back down the precarious rocky descents with wheel lifts aplenty.

Finishing Billy Goats, we continued to the next famous track Pat's Peak. The following tracks providing a bit of reprieve from the difficulty of Billy Goats, but not so much that you didn't have to worry about denting your underbody. Reaching the start of Pat's Peak, we readied ourselves for the difficulty that lay before us but not knowing what awaited us at the summit. The convoy forged on picking lines

carefully to reach our destination and once we reached the peak, we became awestruck of the panoramic view that the ranges provided. With the sun going low, the flat expanse that fed into the ranges and the low grumble of our four-wheel drives, we had conquered the hardest tracks that Bendleby Ranges, and Hungry Ranges had to offer. The only thing left was to descend from Pat's Peak and make our way to camp. No small feat but with slow controlled driving and a couple of wheel lifts we made it back to the main tracks and returned to camp. Our final night at camp we sat around the fire discussing the experiences of days prior and preparing for the trip ahead of us.

The following morning, we left Bendleby Ranges behind us, carrying new scratches holding the adventures memories on our four-wheel drives panels. We had conquered Bendleby Ranges and Hungry Ranges ticking off the first major leg of our journey. All of us eager for what lay ahead as we looked forward to tackling Googs Track.

From here we travelled 3.5 hours to Lake Gairdner staying at Waltumba Campground. A lovely place to camp for the night.

Lake Gairdner is Australia's third largest salt lake. In some parts of the lake, the salt layer can be up to one meter thick! Unlike Lake Eyre, Lake Gairdner isn't fed from a river system, it's purely surface water only.







Thursday 25 September

Leaving Lake Gairdner, we travelled 180km on a well graded road to Kingoonya, arriving around 1pm. We refuelled and checked into the caravan park before enjoying a relaxing afternoon around camp, then a few cold beverages at the Kingoonya Hotel. The Smith family arrived today, and we all enjoyed a delicious meal at the Kingoonya Hotel for dinner.

Friday 26 September

Today was the start of Googs Track. Googs Track is a remote 4WD track in South Australia that runs approximately 200km through Yumbarra Conservation Park and Yellabinna Regional Reserve. The track is said to have over 300 sand dunes.

We travelled from Kingoonya to Tarcoola. Now a ghost town with no population at the last census date, although the town and remaining buildings didn't look all that run down. After a look around Tarcoola we made our way to the northern end of Googs Track arriving late morning. Within 5 minutes on the track, Andy left half of his sand flag in a tree, which led to the beginning of quite a collection of sand flags along the way. We had lunch along the track before arriving at Mount Finke. A 34 degree day had no takers for the 13.4km hike to the summit. We had lunch on the track and turned around and made our way back to Googs Track. After a few hours driving we made our way to Googs Lake where we set up camp and settled in with a selection of cheese, biscuits, and sides to listen to the AFL grand final on the radio. Not the result the Geelong 4WD Club members were hoping for. Most of us went for a walk out onto the lake at some stage. A great day was had.

Sunday 28 September

Day 3 on Googs Track. We had a relaxed start to the day, not needing to pack up the camps as we were spending two nights camped at Googs Lake. A few went for a morning walk out to the island on the lake. We headed off late morning for a day drive when we picked up PJ on the UHF radio, who was heading north on Googs Track not too far from our location. Most of us headed back to camp for lunch while Nathan & Matthew headed out to the main track to find PJ. After lunch, we drove out to Nalara Rockhole and Lois Rockhole. Approx 53km from camp.

Once we arrived in Whyalla and set up camp, we spent the afternoon exploring. Highlights included the HMAS Whyalla, the scenic lookout and the circular jetty, where we were lucky enough to watch dolphins playing in the water below.

Friday 10th October

On Friday morning, we joined a tour of the Whyalla Steelworks, a site with over 100 years of iron and steelmaking history in Australia. The facility is a fully integrated operation, from mining raw materials to distributing finished products. Each year, the steelworks produces around 1.2 million tonnes of raw steel, with approximately 65% sent by rail to Market Mills for







further processing, and the remaining 35% converted into finished products at the Whyalla Rolling Mill. These products primarily serve the construction and rail transport industries.

During the tour, we saw the blast furnace, coke ovens, reed beds, steelmaking and casting plant, and the rolling mills where structural steel, rail line, and railway sleepers are produced; a fascinating and impressive operation.

This was the official final stop on our trip. From Whyalla, we travelled to Port Augusta, where we enjoyed lunch on the waterfront, before saying goodbye to the Fitzpatrick family (our last remaining participants), and beginning the long journey home.

As always, Matthew and I would like to thank everyone who joined us on this adventure. It's the participants who make or break a trip, and we were lucky to share this wonderful experience with some of the very best.
